Calgary and Edmonton had highest rates compared to other major urban centres





#### **VOLATILE PRICES**

In the 24 years (2001–2025) since Alberta deregulated its power sector, electricity prices in Alberta have been as much as five times higher than in the rest of Canada, and significantly more volatile.





#### CHECK-IN

Who has a personal story about auto insurance premiums or power prices?



As of July 2025, Canadians were paying 27.1% more for groceries than in July 2020

In Alberta, food costs were up 35% in the same period

Causes: supply chain disruptions; climate change and extreme weather; higher input costs (especially transportation); and PRICE GOUGING





The increase in fuel prices alone caused 43% of all consumer price inflation in Canada from January 2021 to June 2022.

Total extra cost per house, 2020-2024 = \$12,007

Shifts in supply/demand had little to do with it – the real cause was price gouging

Alberta saw apartment rental prices increase by 16.8% in 2022 and 15.6% in 2023 – the fastest increases in Canada

Even higher in some towns (Fort McLeod 37% in 2024; Valleyview and Vulcan 35% and 31% respectively)

Rental prices softening lately, but still much higher than they were five years ago





Alberta's average home price is \$502,063 – significantly lower than Ontario and BC (though they can be higher in certain markets)

However, wages have not kept up with housing prices





Canada's House-Price Growth Vs Wage Growth: A Historical Look (1981-2025) Coldwell Banker report



"If you've felt like buying a home in Canada has gotten harder over the years, you're not imagining things. The gap between what homes cost and what people earn has stretched wider than at almost any point in modern history."

"The relationship between house prices and wages in Canada has fundamentally changed since 1981. We've gone from a market where homes cost 3-4 times annual income... to one where homes cost 7-10 times income..."

#### THE WORKER AGENDA FOR AFFORDABILITY

- Public auto insurance
- Re-regulate power
- Public grocery option and price controls for staple grocery items
- Excess profits tax to discourage price gouging (at the pump and in grocery stores)
- Rent controls
- Public housing authority



#### OTHER WORKER AGENDA POLICIES FOR AFFORDABILITY

- Full implementation of universal public child care, pharmacare, and dental care
- Say "no" to leaving the Canada Pension Plan (CPP)
- Supplemental Alberta pension plan (on top of CPP, not instead of it)
- Make public transit free

#### THE WORKER AGENDA ON WAGES

- Make wage growth an explicit priority for government
- Set a target: everyone's wages keep up with inflation
- Enhance worker bargaining power
- Pre-distribution instead of re-distribution



#### **WORKER AGENDA WAGE POLICIES**

- \$20 minimum wage
- 40-hour work week
- Make it easier to join unions (single-step certification)
- Make it easier to negotiate collective agreements (sectoral bargaining)
- Pay equity legislation
- Gig Workers Bill of Rights
- Eliminate UCP Overtime (OT) rules
- Get rid of "double-breasting" in construction
- Protect, and enhance, the right to strike



#### Who has the power?

In October, 2025, Alberta labour force = 2,836,800

Only 9 per cent of those are self-employed or business owners

91 per cent are employees i.e., workers (about 2.5 million)
